

Despite being closed due to Covid restrictions, Hintlesham Hall gave the village a firework display on New Year's Eve. As the last rocket lit up the sky above the Hall, calls for "more" and a round of applause echoed around Duke Street and Timperleys.

Speed Sign Update

David Marsh, Chair of the Parish Council, writes:

Back in the May 2020 edition of the Link was the good news that the village was to have its own vehicle activated speed sign. Since it first flashed at incoming motorists from Hadleigh entering via Duke Street at the beginning of April, it has recorded a 10% drop in speeds over 30mph, so its effect in helping reduce speeds is proven and the data obtained from it has been very helpful in gauging vehicle movement levels. At the time, it was announced that it would be moved around the village between various positions.

After much reminding and cajoling, Suffolk highways have finally modified three more posts in order for us to achieve this. The sign has now been installed on Silver Hill to remind motorists entering the village from Ipswich of the 30 mph speed limit. Judging by the reactions from passing cars, there has been an immediate beneficial effect. Further posts sited on George Street entering the Village from Hadleigh, and an additional position in Duke Street for vehicles leaving in the direction of Hadleigh and Chattisham, are now waiting for the sign to take its turn. This, and the acquisition of our own speed gun to allow greater flexibility for our Speedwatch team show the Parish Council's continuing commitment to keeping speeds down in our village.

H&C Parish Council Meeting Notes -

meeting held via Zoom on 14 January



The first meeting of the year unfortunately begins with notice of the resignation of the Parish Council Chair – David Marsh and the Parish Council Clerk - Jo Brown. They have both served the Parish council well and It will be a real challenge to replace them.

In November 2020 the Grit bin located at the junction of the 1070 and Cherrygrounds mysteriously disappeared. Councillor Jamie Bostock kindly organised a replacement which is now in place, full of grit and ready for use.

Planning:

The following applications were not supported by the council due to them not conforming with the Council's policy of not supporting backfill development within the Parishes.

DC/20/05873 – Rosslyn House, Duke Street, Hintlesham – Erection of 1no dwelling with garaging and landscaping

DC/20/05874 – Rosslyn House, Duke Street, Hintlesham – Erection of 1no dwelling with garaging and associated landscaping and improved highways access

VAS sign:

Thanks go to Les Cole for organising the repositioning of The VAS (Vehicle Activated Sign) onto the 1071 recording vehicle speeds as they come into Hintlesham from Ipswich.

Discussion took place regarding the planting of trees and replanting of hedgerows in and round the villages after receiving a paper submitted by resident Ali Martin. The paper promoted the positive effects of increasing biodiversity and improving habitats by reinstating and gapping hedges in these valuable wildlife corridors. Councillors John Whyman and Jamie Bostock agreed to meet with Ali to discuss the initiative further.

Accident reporting:

Councillor Chris Leney reported there had been 3 accidents on the 1071 recently and encouraged people to continue reporting any accidents they were aware of to A1071accidents@gmail.com

MUGA:

Due to Government current Coronavirus guidelines, the MUGA is now locked until further notice. Signs are in place to discourage people from attempting to use the MUGA at the present time.

The Village Directory:

It was decided to put a hold on printing and distributing the new Village Directory until a new Parish Council Chairman and Clerk were in place.

Fly Tipping:

There are still incidents of fly tipping in the villages and the parish council would like to remind people that if they see evidence of fly tipping to report it. Babergh District Council are usually very proactive at responding to reports of fly tipping. 

Free Parking in Hadleigh Under Threat

Parking charges may be introduced at Babergh Council's car parks, including in Hadleigh, later this year. Proposals which could see free parking limited to just 30 minutes have been discussed at several meetings and a final decision is expected in February. The Village Link asked Councillor David Busby (Lib Dem), who represents the Washbrook and Copdock ward (which includes Hintlesham & Chattisham) for his take on this contentious issue which affects so many car users in the villages.

Short-Term Car Parking Charges – A Tale of Two Towns

I hate paying for car parking, especially £7 for 3 minutes at Luton Airport recently. In 18 years as a Councillor, I have never supported the introduction of car parking charges in Babergh, accepting that




Sudbury town centre is in decline despite free parking. There is too much local traffic (40% of car journeys are less than 2km), car parks are too busy, public transport too expensive and there is a need for regeneration. Something more radical is required to stem the decline and support the ongoing projects to improve Belle Vue Park, Hamilton Road, Market Hill and the climate change target.

In Hadleigh, free parking is an attraction to both visitors and the independent retailers who are keeping the High Street healthy. Traffic is less of an issue and public transport less available. Car parks are used as the starting point for circular walks and for parents meeting children from school.

Visitors to the key centres in Babergh expect different experiences from each town and therefore it makes little sense in applying a 'one size fits all parking policy'. As much as I am generally against charging for car parking in our towns there is probably a good argument in favour of a nominal charge of say £1 in Sudbury with Hadleigh staying free for the moment. But, who better to understand their towns than the Town Councils, so maybe it would be better if they ran and financed their own car parks.

A final decision on parking charges in Babergh District is expected to be made on 4th February.
